ART-10B Intermediate Painting

2.0 Units

I. Catalog Description

This course is designed as a studio course in acrylic, or watercolor painting building upon basic techniques. Intermediate materials and techniques will be explored. Historical, aesthetic, and cultural points of view will be considered. This course has been approved for online delivery. To cover costs for materials, a \$35.00 lab fee will be charged at the time of enrollment. Student may need to purchase Additional supplies to create more extensive projects.

Prerequisite(s): ART 10A Beginning Painting:

Prerequisite Skills: Before entering this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate basic knowledge of painting materials.
- 2. Demonstrate basic painting techniques in oils, acrylics, and watercolors.
- 3. Explore various subject matter.

III. Course Objectives

A. Course Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Use equipment and techniques in the chosen medium (acrylic, or water color) to produce images in alternative methods of visual expression such as cubism and non-representationalism.
- 2. Use alternate techniques such as glazing, additives, etc., in the chosen medium to visually express selected subject matter.
- 3. Use appropriate terminology in choosing the subject matter and describing the painting style to use.

B. Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate control of the medium to produce a more sophisticated illusion of three-dimensional realism.
- 2. Demonstrate increased knowledge of past major styles and individual artists (Realism, Impressionism, Expressionism, Cubism, Surrealism, Non-representationalism) and how they relate to his/her work.
- 3. Use color theory and techniques beyond reproduction of visual reality.
- 4. Experiment with aspects of past styles and arts of non-Western cultures that they wish to incorporate into their work.

- 5. Express their reasons for selecting certain subject matter and use techniques to express their personal feelings toward the subject to the viewer.
- 6. Show awareness and control of the entire creative process, from conception through preparation, culminating in execution of the work.

IV. Course Content

- 1. Select subject for painting, and choose medium with instructor input.
- 2. Execute and evaluate painting.
- 3. Illustrated lectures/discussions on various past and contemporary styles that the student may wish to adopt.
- 4. Student chooses (with instructor input) and researches style(s) to incorporate.
- 5. Select subject and execute paintings incorporating elements discussed.
- 6. Prepare work for presentation in annual student show.
- 7. Repeat process increasing complexity and sophistication.

V. Assignments

A. Appropriate Readings

Readings from library materials and internet.

B. Writing Assignments

- 1. Critiquing art shows, work of a favorite artist
- 2. Illustrated research of styles student wishes to incorporate

C. Expected Outside Assignments

Student will produce a Portfolio. Homework assignments may be visiting art galleries/shows.

D. Specific Assignments that Demonstrate Critical Thinking

- 1. Select subject(s) with instructor input
 - a. Determine subject matter that most appeals to student
 - b. Explore best methods to express students' feelings about chosen subject
 - c. Select subject matter for a series of paintings exploring various methods of expressing subject.

VI. Methods of Evaluation

- 4. Written/illustrated research on artists and cultural styles to be incorporated into students developing style.
