# **ART-10D Portfolio Painting**

## 2.0 Units

### I. Catalog Description

This course is designed as a studio course in, acrylic, or watercolor painting expanding upon advanced techniques. Advanced materials and techniques will be explored. The student will experiment with various personal styles and execute a body of work for exhibition/presentation. Historical, aesthetic, and cultural points of view will be considered. This course has been approved for online delivery. To cover costs of paints brushes and canvas, a \$35.00 lab fee will be charged at the time of enrollment. Student may need to purchase additional supplies to create more extensive projects.

- 1. Demonstrate advanced painting techniques.
- 2. Demonstrate ability to critique paintings.
- 3. Demonstrate beginning development of a personal style.

# **III.** Course Objectives

### A. Course Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Produce a portfolio of paintings suitable for presentation.
- 2. Discuss and/or write using appropriate terminology during the presentation of the portfolio for display or further education.

### **B.** Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Show refinement of their developing personal style.
- 2. Develop an assembled body of work for exhibition/presentation.
- 3. Verbally explain their work to a group and 'defend' their methods in an individual critique setting.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of contemporary alternatives to traditional methods of expression (conceptual art, installation art).
- 5. Demonstrate the use of contemporary alternatives to express a subject of the student's choice (with instructor input).

# IV. Course Content

- A. Select subject for series.
- B. Refer to series by past artists through illustrated lectures, research and discussion.
- C. Determine changes subject will undergo in series.

- D. Execute drawings and/or preparatory paint sketches.
- E. Preparation of painting surfaces.
- F. Series of at least three paintings.
- G. View and discuss alternative methods of expression such as conceptual art, installation, etc.
- H. Conceptual work and/or installation.
- I. Continue to develop a personal style.
- J. Exhibition in annual student show, College Art Gallery, or business establishment.
- K. Begin to assemble a portfolio for formal presentation.

## V. Assignments

#### A. Appropriate Reading

Readings from library materials and internet.

#### **B.** Writing Assignments

- 1. Critiquing art shows, work of a favorite artist.
- 2. Illustrated research of styles student wishes to incorporate

#### C. Expected Outside Assignments

Homework assignments may be made and visiting art shows and art galleries.

### **D.** Specific Assignments that Demonstrate Critical Thinking

- 1. Select subject(s)
  - a. Determine subject matter that most appeals to student.
  - b. Discuss best methods to express student's feelings about chosen subject.
  - c. Select subject matter for a series of paintings exploring various methods of expressing subject.
- 2. Preparatory drawings/paintings sketches.
- 3. View/discuss various styles student may wish to incorporate into his/her style.
- 4. Use techniques designed to promote development of a personal style.
- 5. Execute a series (at least three) of variations on a chosen subject.
- 6. Plan and execute a conceptual work and/or installation
- 7. Show work in the student show.
- 8. Verbally explain their work to a group presentation.
- 9. Defend their work in an individual critique.

## VI. Methods of Evaluation

Traditional Classroom Delivery

All students will be evaluated on:

- 1. Participation
- 2. Amount of work produced
- 3. Critical evaluation of work produced
- 4. Written/illustrated research on artists and cultural styles to be incorporated into students developing style.
- 5. Portfolio

### **Online Delivery**

A variety of methods will be used, such as: research papers, asynchronous and synchronous (chat/forum) discussions, online quizzes and exams, posting to online website and email communications.
