# **ART-19D Portfolio Digital Photography**

### **1.0 Unit**

### I. Catalog Description

An advanced digital photography course with the aim of producing a portfolio of work demonstrating a personal style for presentation and exhibition. Photography as a fine art and as a commercial application will be explored. Technical, aesthetic, cultural, and historic points of view will be considered. To cover the costs of printing, a \$10.00 laboratory fee will be charged at the time of registration.

Prerequisite: Art 19C Advanced Digital Photography

### **Prerequisite Skills:**

Before entering this course the student should be able to:

- 1. Begin to produce a portfolio of work that expresses their photographic aesthetic.
- 2. Have knowledge of the correct exposure and manipulation tools and techniques to make number '1' above possible.
- 3. Prepare work for presentation.

**Recommended Preparation**: English 105 or equivalent placement through the assessment process.

#### A. Course Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Produce a body of work that effectively expresses their personal photographic aesthetic.
- 2. Prepare the work suitably for presentation to an institution for furthering their photographic education, an entry-level job in the photographic field, or a commercial gallery for show.

#### **B.** Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course the student will possess a portfolio of work:

- 1. Which Reflects their preferences in subject matter and form of expression, in short, their "photographic aesthetic"
- 2. That is suitable for display or presentation to further their photographic career.

- D. Creating an effective physical portfolio

- E. "Defending" a personal aesthetic to viewers

### V. Assignments

### A. Appropriate Readings

Students will be assigned weekly reading assignments from the representative texts as well as readings from various technical manuals relative to subject areas being covered.

### **B.** Writing Assignments

Students will write short reports regarding the use of increased mastery of image capture techniques to express the subject.

### C. Expected Outside Assignments

Students will research a photographer of their choice that is relevant to their aesthetic and will make a short presentation on them using appropriate visual aids

### D. Specific Assignments that Demonstrate Critical Thinking

Students will prepare work for professional presentation and will give a "mock" presentation for the class.

### VI. Methods of Evaluation

The first day of class the instructor will provide each student with a written course syllabus indicating the evaluation procedures to be used. The formulation of a student grade will be based upon:

- 1. Quizzes
- 2. Critiques
- 3. Presentations
- 4. Portfolio
