III. **Course Objectives**

A. Course Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate skills and knowledge necessary to obtain a Pediatric First Aid Card.
- 2. Demonstrate skills and knowledge necessary to acquire a CPR Card for infants, children and adults.
- 3. Demonstrate skills and knowledge necessary to obtain California Child Care Health and Safety Certification

B. Course Objectives

Upon completion of the course the student will be able to:

- 1. Describe Emergency Medical Services system and will be able to access the system.
- 2. Explain and perform basic first aid procedures for common injuries of infants, toddlers, preschool and school age children.
- 3. Describe and perform infant, child and adult CPR as described by the American Red Cross.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of preventative health practices and injury prevention.
- 5. Describe appropriate nutritional programs for youth based on current guidelines.

D. Specific Assignments that Demonstrate Critical Thinking

Students will critique, analyze and develop an action plan to hypothetical health and safety situations.

VI. Methods of Evaluation

Traditional Classroom Evaluation:

Demonstration of skills, written analysis, final exam, participation.

Hybrid Evaluation:

All quizzes and exams will be administered during the in-person class time. Students will be expected to complete online assignments and activities equivalent to in class assignments and activities for the online portion of the course. Electronic communication, both synchronous and asynchronous (chat/forum) will be evaluated for participation and to maintain effective communication between instructor and students.

Online Evaluation:

A variety of methods will be used, such as: research papers, asynchronous and synchronous (chat/forum) discussions, online quizzes and exams, posting to online website and email communications using the district's approved learning management system.

Traditional Delivery:

Traditional classroom instruction will consist of lectures, visual aids, discussions and group activities.
