I. Catalog Description

This course provides basic training in wildland fire suppression and crew person subject overage includes wildland fire behavior, skills of wildland fire suppression, practice with common fireline hand tools, and working safely in wildland fire environment. [Meets U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management requirements for Firefighter Type 2: L-180, S-130 and S-190.] To be awarded the certificates at the end of the course students must successfully complete the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) IS-100 (Introduction to the Incident Command System, ICS-100) and IS-700 (An introduction to the National Incident Management System) online at https://training.fema.gov/ (free to students).
