A weekly class meeting provides the academic element to the field experiential course (HUS 42) offering. The application of concepts gained in the prerequisite or co-requisite course to the field experience will be emphasized. This course is designed to provide the student with an opportunity to develop skills that would facilitate gaining employment in the human services field.

Prerequisites: HUS 10 Introduction to Social Work and Human Services or PSY 1 Introduction to Psychology, or SOC 1 Introduction to Sociology

- 2. Codes of Ethics (e.g., NASW or NOHS) and social justice principles
- 3. Legal context of social work practice/human services, and the role of supervision in the professional development journey
- 4. Resources and services that clients need and depend upon
- 5. Examination of the needs, interests, resources, values and opportunities of people who vary in terms of race, nationality, ethnicity, sexuality, religion, gender, age, abilities, or economic status.
- 6. Exploring the progressive nature and skills of generalist practice.
