

Faculty Emeritus is just one title in the long list of Chavez's impressive resume

When Bernadette Chavez arrived in Susanville in 1972, she had no idea she would change so many lives or impact so many students. She didn't even know where Susanville was located, she just knew her hippy spirit loved the mountains and was ready for an adventure. Born in Richmond, California, Chavez was raised in a family that was service oriented. Her mother, a teacher, was from Beirut, Lebanon, and her father was from New Mexico.

Chavez knew her life's mission was to teach despite her mom telling her and her siblings not to go into teaching because "your work is never done". Chavez couldn't deny her calling, and neither could her two sisters, who also became teachers. Her brother, who is a writer/producer in Hollywood, and works with 'Dancing with the Stars', teaches periodically at UCLA.

Growing up in the 1960s, Chavez was accustomed to antifeminist views but not comfortable with them. In high school, she exceled in physics, physiology/ anatomy, and chemistry and considered becoming a doctor even though she knew the world expected her to be a housewife. She started modeling in the ninth grade until her junior year of college, and that led to pageants. She was crowned Miss Contra Costa County in 1966, but Chavez knew this wasn't the life she wanted, so she left modeling and pageantry and focused on her

education.

"At this point of my life, I chose to develop my brain rather than make money modeling," said Chavez. "My choices in life were never based on making money, only doing what I loved."

Chavez received her Associate of Arts from Contra Costa College and her Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from Chico State. She remained at Chico State to earn her Masters in Psychology. After graduation, she returned to the Bay Area to become a psychology research assistant at the University of California at Berkeley. She returned to Chico State where she

The day closed out with a reception at The Boardroom Ale House in Susanville.



Winter Sports Report

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

For the first time in 10 years, the Lady Cougars made it to the CCCAA playoffs. They turned around last year's record of 4-21, a season plagued with injuries, losing four players to ACL tears, to finish 19-11.

Lassen upset state ranked conference foe Feather River College at home, to finish in second place in the conference. The Lady Cougars lost in the first round to Chabot College, but will only graduate three sophomores and are expected to contend for the Golden Valley Conference title next year.

Freshmen Maddie Camacho, Shayla Carrier and Jocelyn Gandara earned All-Conference honors. Freshman Hannah Carson earned Honorable Mention, despite missing the last four games to a knee injury.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

The 2017-18 campaign was a roller coaster ride for the Cougars. The team started the year with a strong performance at the San Jose City College Tournament finishing 2-1 and bringing home the Consolation Championship trophy. After the strong start the Cougars were hit with the injury bug which delayed a lot of the development of the team as a whole. Lassen then lost eight straight games (seven of the those teams made the playoffs and two made the Elite 8) as they struggled to find their identity as a team.

Despite the adversity this Cougar team fought all year and found their stride towards the second half of the season. Lassen finished the year going 6-6 in their final 12 games which included a big road victory against Big 8 Conference member American River College by 12 points. The Cougars played their best basketball to finish the season winning two out of their last three games which included a 14-point win against College of the Redwoods, a close nine point loss against state ranked Butte College and then a 25 point win to close out the season against College of the Siskiyous.

Unwana Ekiko and Kameron Brandon were named All-Conference and Max Denham was selected Honorable Mention. DeMario Newman made the All-Defensive Team.

Former Cougars Meet in the NCAA Sweet 16



Cherie Hogg, a 1992 alumnus of Lassen College and member of the 1992 Lady Cougar State Championship team that went 35-1, is now an assistant coach with the University of Buffalo women's basketball team. In her sophomore season, Hogg was named to the All-State team and played for Gary Kloppenburg, who has also coached in the WNBA and NBA.

Buffalo faced the University of South Carolina (USC) in the Sweet Sixteen. USC is the 2017 National Champion. Fred Chmiel, who was an assistant coach with Lassen College men's basketball team, is now an assistant coach with the Lady Gamecocks. Chmiel coached under Kloppenburg after he took over the men's program in the mid-1990's.

USC defeated Buffalo, 79-63, to advance to the Elite 8 but lost to Connecticut in the next round.

Caleb Wood (below), Class of 2016, and the University of Penn basketball team made it to the NCAA tournament. They lost to Kansas in the first round. Caleb, a senior at the University of Penn, was named to the Academic All Ivy League team and was instrumental in their tournament bid.
